NOTES FROM

SUPERINTENDENT JAY

Dear Skykomish Community,

It's so good to be back into the swing of things and to hear children in our building. Lots of work happens during the summer months, but the real joy is witnessing the return of our students, our faculty, and our staff. I was so thrilled to welcome them back!

As I begin my fourth year in Skykomish School District I continue to feel incredibly blessed and grateful beyond words to serve in this capacity as your District's Superintendent and I look forward to our work together in ensuring that every child succeeds, no exceptions, no excuses.

I am also excited to share with you some great initiatives that we have for the 2019-2020 school year:

- Parent/guardian engagement and learning focused on the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families. In August, I and several staff members, Allison Luker, Sonia Bartosek, and Rosemary Mitchell became certified trainers. We will develop a training schedule and share it with you as soon as possible.
- This year we enter our second year as a *Leader in* Me school. This year we will focus on Aligning Academics to help achieve





personal, classroom, and student goals. Students will maintain a Leadership Notebook to celebrate: 1) themselves; 2) their Wildly Important Goals (WIG); 3) their learning; 4) their leadership; and 5) celebrations. We will achieve this through *The 4 Disciplines Mountain*, which is comprised of the following disciplines: Discipline 1: FOCUS ON THE WILDLY IMPORTANT: Choose Your WIG; Discipline 2: ACT ON THE LEAD MEASURES: Take the Key Steps; Discipline 3: KEEP A COMPELLING SCOREBOARD: Keep Score; and Discipline 4: CREATE A CADENCE OF ACCOUNTABILITY: Huddle Up.

During our accreditation process last year, the outside accrediting team recommended that we develop a multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS) and Response to intervention (RTI). RTI is a framework that many schools use to help students who are struggling with academics. There are three levels of intervention in RTI. A multi-tier system of supports (MTSS) is more comprehensive. It may include the three levels of RTI, but MTSS goes beyond just academics. It also covers social and emotional supports. That means it can include behavior intervention plans. MTSS covers the adults at school, too. It includes things like professional development for teachers. MTSS also focuses on creating ways for adults to team up to help struggling kids. This year we will be developing and implementing these support systems.

This fall you will also notice that we are running for the first time, a Technology Levy, to ask for the public's support in ensuring that we can continue to provide our students with a one-to-one laptop program—every student will continue to have access to their own personal computer device, providing teachers with updated instructional tools—teacher laptops and electronic whiteboards in each classroom, and professional development training for teachers on how to best implement technology into their instruction. This levy will also be used to replace our 15-year-old phone system, which we rely upon to make daily announcements, emergency communications, and communicating with parents, families, and the

The Board of Directors of Skykomish School District No. 404 adopted Resolution No. 07_31_2019 concerning a technology modernization levy. The proposition authorizes acquiring educational and operational technology, equipment, and training, including classroom computers to support instruction, and authorizes the following excess levies on all taxable property within the District.

Passage of Proposition No.1 would allow the levy of \$75,000 in property taxes within Skykomish School District No. 404 for collection in 2020, the levy of \$75,000 for collection in 2021, the levy of \$75,000 for collection in 2022 and the levy of \$75,000 for collection in 2023, to fund acquisition and installation, implementation and management of computer technology and technology systems, facilities and projects, including but not limited to enhancing infrastructure, acquiring hardware, licensing software, and implementing online applications and training. In accordance with Resolution No. 07_31_2019 approving this proposition, these taxes would be collected over the 2019-2020 through 2023-2024 school years, inclusive, and deposited in the District's Capital Projects Fund for such improvements to meet the current and future educational programs for its students. If authorized by voters, and based on projected assessed valuation information, estimated levy rates per \$1,000 of assessed value would be \$1.62 (2020 collection), \$1.62 (2021 collection), \$1.62 (2023 collection). The exact levy rate shall be adjusted based on the actual assessed value of the property within the District at the time of the levy.

WHAT IS TITLE I?

Title I is a federal program that provides additional academic assistance to students needing academic support in math, reading, and English language arts to reach proficiency.

WHAT IS THE GOAL OF TITLE I?

The goal of Title I is to provide additional instructional services and activities to students who would benefit from extra support beyond classroom instruction in mathematics, reading, and writing.

WHERE DO TITLE I FUNDS COME FROM?

As part of the ESEA, the Federal Government provides money for Title I to our State Education Agency. School districts then receive a grant and allocate money to schools based on several factors, including free & reduced lunch status.

Skykomish School District is a Title I School

School-wide: All students fall under the Title I designation and those students who demonstrate academic need are given additional support. Title I activities are available to all students. *To help students succeed, Title I teachers:*

- Identify students who need additional educational support
- Create an individualized program
- Focus on improving reading and math skills
- Measure student progress to determine the success of the Title I program for each student.

Research Shows:

NOTES FROM ENGLISH CLASS

Welcome back to another year of class!

We have begun the year with a favorite among our high school students in grades 10 through 12—a project-based learning unit where students have the opportunity to become teachers for one whole class period. This is a wonderful activity to begin the year with, because it reminds students how much work is put into the creation of lesson plans and assessments, and it teaches them how to become leaders.

This year we are joined by the eighth-grade class. These students are beginning the year with a unit on friendship. Students are working on a novel study of *Amina's Voice* by Hena Khan. *Amina's Voice* is a story about a middle school girl named Amina who is struggling with a transition in both her family and social life. When her local mosque is vandalized, Amina's life is further tipped upside down, and she feels like an outsider in her own city. During this unit, students are focusing on questions like: *How can I understand a character's identities, motiv*-

ations, and world views? What might be common experiences and customs for young Muslim Americans? and What choices do people have when they encounter a person or a group who is different from them?

In other news, in March, Ms. Shelton's students will be taking a field trip to Seattle to see a matinee of Seattle Shakespeare Company's *The Tempest*. Taken from Seattle Shakespeare Company's website: "Stripped of power, position, and wealth, for 12 long years Prospero has plotted in exile on an enchanted island. When enemies sail too close, Prospero conjures a magical storm to shipwreck the passengers. The mysterious island holds secrets, along with curious creatures and fantastical spirits. While dispensing justice and watching over his daughter's emerging romance, Prospero's old wounds begin to heal, and reconciliation and forgiveness seem within reach for all." *The Tempest* is thought to be Shakespeare's final play.

HIGHLY CAPABLE SELECTION PROCESS

What is it?

Highly Capable Services are designed for students who perform or show potential for performing at significantly advanced academic levels when compared with others of their age, experiences, or environments. Successful candidates are often independent learners who thrive on progressively challenging opportunities, utilize advanced problem-solving, and enjoy in-depth study and presentation of the curriculum. Students qualifying for Highly Capable Services shall receive appropriate curriculum and instruction to meet their academic needs.

Who can be nominated?

Any students in grades Kindergarten through 12th grade, who live in the Skykomish School District boundaries.

Who can nominate students?

Nominations for the Highly Capable Program may come from parents, teachers, school staff, students, and other community members.

How can I nominate a student?

What's next?

Once a referral is received, you will receive a nomination form to complete. In addition, the counselor will review the current standardized testing and grades. A Gifted and Talented Evaluation Scale (GATES) will be provided to the student's teacher. This is a norm-referenced rating scale which identifies intellectual ability, academic skills, creativity, leadership, and artistic talent in comparison to average students their age. An additional screener, the Screening Assessment for Gifted Elementary and Middle School Students (SAGES-3) will be given to K-8 students by the counselor.

Following the screening process, if a committee determines it is possible the student may qualify for Highly Capable Services, the parent/guardian will be provided

Operation School Bell & Teen Retail

Our high school students will be participating again this year in the Teen Retail night at Fred Meyer. This program is paid sponsored and by Assistance League of Everett. This event provides up to \$125 worth of free school clothing to our high school students who qualify, and is provided without cost or obligation to parents or guardians.

Students must check-in at the Monroe Fred Meyer store before shopping for school clothes (i.e. pants, jeans, shirts, jackets, shoes, socks, and underwear). Parents are welcomme to attend with students. Students are responsible for transportation to and from Fred Meyer. Forms will be sent home October 1, 2019. Students will need to bring their student ID along with the signed form to be able to shop. Skykomish School is set up to shop on Tuesday, October 15th. You may check in from 4:45 to 6:30 and shop until 8:00 pm.

The Operation School Bell program for our elementary and middle school students who qualify will not be happening until January 2020. STEM COMES TO **SKY** Kimberly McCullough – High School Math & Science Teacher


